

EVERGREENS

EASTERN WHITE PINE

Very hardy pine grows stately and gracefully tall. Needles are soft and bluish-green in color. With adequate moisture, growth can be 12-18" per year. Ideal for planting, shade windbreaks and Christmas trees. This is a native pine for NE Pennsylvania.

AUSTRIAN PINE

The Austrian Pine is a densely branched tree producing long dark needles. It does well in a variety of soils and is very hardy. This fast growing pine tree makes an attractive Christmas tree. It will tolerate both limestone or acidic soils, dry rocky locations and windy conditions.

NORWAY SPRUCE

This graceful pyramidal has sharp, shiny, dark green needles. Beautiful spreading branches with drooping twigs. An extremely hardy tree that is successful under most soil conditions. Fast growth makes the spruce ideal for timber.

BALSAM FIR

Widespread use as Christmas trees. Prefers a cool, moist, sheltered location. Needles are 1 inch long, flat and blue-green in color, very fragrant. Will grow to 75 feet. Also excellent for wildlife shelter.

COLORADO BLUE SPRUCE

Grows to 100 ft. , 6 ft. in 8 or 9 years. Creates colorful dense windbreak planted 6 ft. apart. Likes average soil and moisture with full sun.

CONCOLOR FIR

An evergreen with flat, varying soft green to deep blue needles. A very hardy tree growing in a variety of well-drained soils, standing dryness and high temperatures better than other firs.

HARDWOODS

BLACK WALNUT

Native nut tree of eastern U.S. Medium size, round-headed tree known chiefly for its edible nuts and prized for its fine wood in furniture construction. Grows in a variety of soils, but best in fertile, well-drained soil, height at maturity 50 to 75 feet.

RED OAK

Fast growing oak, maturing with a broad round head, leaves turning a red to reddish brown in Autumn. Will tolerate a wide range of soil types from acid to alkaline.

BLACK CHERRY

Valuable timber tree which can be planted in open or as an under-planting. Does well in a wide variety of soil types. Good species for wildlife food.

WINTERBERRY HOLLY

Winterberry is a shrub usually from 6 to 8 feet high with grayish bark and smooth twigs. The leaves are from 2 to 3 inches long and about an inch wide. In autumn the leaves turn black. The flowers which appear from May to July are small and white. The bright-red, shining fruits are about the size of a pea.

AMERICAN CRANBERRY

This is an excellent deciduous plant for screening up to 10 to 12 ft. The American Cranberry Bush has showy white flowers in spring followed by red berries in fall and winter. This shrub has very few insect problems and prefers wet to average soil. Berries may be made into sauce or jelly.

AMERICAN HAZELNUT

The American Hazelnut commonly occurs in dry or moist thickets, woodland and borders of woodland, in valleys and upland. The fruit is a globe shape nut enclosed in a large, leaf-like covering. The American Hazelnut is very winter hardy and an excellent species for wildlife food and habitat.

BLUEBERRIES

Duke – Excellent, large berry, upright and very productive.

Jersey – Excellent, medium berry, upright and productive.

Burlington – Old time variety, excellent, medium berry on 7 ft. bush.

STRAWBERRIES

Cavendish – Cavendish, which originates in Nova Scotia, is the result of a cross between two varieties known for their winter hardiness and attractive, large fruit. It produces high yields that ripen over a long growing season.

RASPBERRIES

Jaelyn – Jaelyn is quite vigorous and erect, growing 4 to 5 feet tall. The fruit is a distinct dark red when ripe. Drupelets are held tightly together with a long, narrow plug cavity. Fruit is firm and exhibits less fruit rot and sunscald than other varieties.

APPLE TREES

Honeycrisp – The fruit is mostly orange-red with a yellow background. This crisp, juicy, sweet apple has a rich flavor that has made it #1 in taste panels.

Gala – has 90%-100% red color with a strong stripe. With its early and high color, this Gala can be picked at proper maturity for best possible storage and flavor retention.

Wolf River – is an antique variety known best for its large size. It is an early season apple, excellent for cooking and baking. The finish is a very pale reddish blush on yellow background. Wolf River is considered somewhat disease resistant and is a very winter hardy tree.

Albemarle Pippin – This old time or “antique” apple variety was an important commercial variety in the early 1900s. The fruit is greenish-yellow, medium to large with excellent fruit quality. Albemarle Pippin matures in early October and will keep in cold storage for six months.

PLUM

Victory – It is a heart-shaped European type plum with dark blue skin, yellow-green firm flesh and an attractive finish.

MOUNTAIN LAUREL

Carol – This bushy eastern native shrub, which is grown for its showy flowers, is best suited in an informal border or woodland setting. Leaves are oval, dark green, glossy, to 5 inches long. Pick cup-shaped flowers are held in large corymbs 3 to 4 inches across open from May to June. Loves moist, acid soil. Carol has bright red buds that open to almost pure white, with broad thick lustrous dark green leaves.

Sarah – Leaves are oval, dark green, glossy, to 5 inches long. Pink cup-shaped flowers are held in large corymbs 3 to 4 inches across open from May to June. Loves moist, acid soil. Sarah has a long flowering season. It has vivid red buds that open to bright pink-red with exceptional foliage and habit.
